

Creating Songs or Using Familiar Songs

A simple way to create new songs or to improvise songs during play is to add new lyrics to familiar children songs. Many Early Childhood songs are created this way and anyone can do it! You can also just sing the songs on la la, dee dee or add speech sounds that children are working on.

Some examples:

Skip To My Lou – Hello or Movement song Hello to you and clap your hands (three times) Hello to you today Or Clap, clap, clap your hands Add stomp your feet, pat your knees, etc.

The Wheels On The Bus – Scarf or parachute song about leaves The leaves in the trees blow up and down, up and down, up and down The leaves on the trees blow up and down all day long (blow side to side, fly round and round, come falling down)

Two Little Blackbirds – Song and Fingerplay about opposities Two little blackbirds sitting on a hill One named Jack and one name Jill (fast/slow, loud/soft) Fly away Jack, fly away Jill (hands fly behind back) Come back Jack, come back Jill

Row your Boat - Sticks - Tap Tap Tap Your Sticks

Tap tap tap your sticks
Gently down the stream
Merrily, merrily
Life is but a dream
Scrape scrape your sticks
Tap tap tap the floor
Pound, pound pound your sticks
Hammer hammer hammer your sticks
Roll roll roll your sticks
Stir stir stir the soup
Make make make and "X" (or a T or other letters or shapes)
